Culture | From Pinakotheken to Brandhorst: This is where art fans find what they are looking for

Munich From the Pinakotheken and the Haus der Kunst to the Museum of Contemporary Art: the selection of exhibitions and collections for art fans is huge and there is something for everyone. The **Pinakothek der Moderne** is one of the largest collection houses for modern and contemporary art, architecture and design in Europe. Thus, an overall show of the arts of the 20th and 21st centuries is possible on an area of around 12,000 square meters. Each of the museums has its own lighting concept to perfectly set the stage for the various exhibitions. The world's largest collection of the Blaue Reiter is a must-see for tourists and locals alike! The **Lenbachhaus** presents Munich art of the 19th century, the Blaue Reiter and the Neue Sachlichkeit (new objectivity), as well as international contemporary art. Many world-famous originals such as Blaues Pferd by Franz Marc or Türkisches Café by August Macke can be seen here. In addition, there are changing special exhibitions on international contemporary artists and classics from the collection, as well as a variety of guided tours and workshops.

70 years of Munich | 2006–2015

2006: The opening match of the Football World Cup (9th June), in which the host Germany plays against Costa Rica, is the prelude to a German soccer euphoria of unprecedented proportions.

2006: Opening of Munich's newly built main synagogue at St. Jakobs-Platz. Thus, 61 years after the end of the war, Munich's Jewish community once again has a dignified place of worship in the center of the city.

The architecture of the museum is also a highlight: the artist's villa, built in 1887 in the Tuscan style by Gabriel von Seidl, was expanded in 2013 with a modern cubic extension. The **Haus der Kunst** does not have its own collection; it is purely an exhibition house. And that is its great strength: it has the possibility to give a lot of space to the changing programs. Current topics such as postcolonialism and feminism are highlighted in the museum through changing exhibitions. Given the eventful history of the historic building itself, you'll experience a unique tension between history and the present here. It was built from 1933 to 1937 with Adolf Hitler's personal involvement according to plans by Paul Ludwig Troost in a monumental neoclassical style.



The Museum of Urban and Contemporary Art (**MUCA**) is Germany's first museum for urban art. It aims to contribute to the art historical classification of the urban street art scene and to recognize it as an art movement in its own right. In the heart of Munich's old town, urban and street art find a home in this museum. On three floors as well as in the adjacent MUCA Bunker, the works of renowned, internationally celebrated artists such as Banksy can be seen in changing special exhibitions but also in the permanent collection.

Leisure | Surfing in the city

Eisbachwelle The Eisbach wave at the entrance to the English Garden inspires surfing fans and onlookers from all over the world. It is considered the world's most constant, biggest and best river wave in the middle of a big city. People have been surfing here for 40 years. In the Lehel district, the Eisbach rises to the surface on Prinzregentenstrasse, just a few steps from the Haus der Kunst. A stone step at the outlet creates a standing wave about half a meter high. The feats of the surfers are a popular photo motif for the numerous onlookers. Thanks to neoprene, surfing is possible in almost any weather and at any time of day, even in winter. International stars of the scene like Jack Johnson or Garret McNamara have also been spotted on the wave. Watching is recommended at any time. However, only absolute professionals should venture into the water here, because surfing is neither easy nor harmless.

Bavarian food | Cheese spaetzle

500 g flour, 5 eggs, 1/8 liter mineral water, salt, 200 g cheese, 100 g mountain cheese, 3 large onions, butter

1. Slice the peeled onion into thin half rings and let them color in plenty of butter. Grate all the cheese and mix.
2. Sift the flour into a bowl. Add eggs, mineral water and a good pinch of salt.
3. Pour the dough in portions into the spaetzle slicer and plane the spaetzle into a pot with plenty of salted, hot water.
4. As soon as the spaetzle float on the surface, let them stand for about 30 seconds and skim them with a slotted spoon and place in a preheated casserole dish.
5. Place a layer of cheese on top. Repeat this until the batter is used up and bake the spaetzle for 20 minutes.
6. Finally, spread the browned onions over the Kässpätzlen and serve.

Enjoy your meal with a green salad and a cold beer!
